Revolving Loan Fund

De-Go-La RC&D has received a grant from the USDA-Rural Development Agency for a Revolving Loan Fund (RLF). This proactive approach to relieving depressed economic situations has been successful in many areas of the United States.

The RLF will provide opportunities by creating a community driven, cost effective, credit delivery system for self employed business owners in our rural area and small towns.

There are many individuals who possess skills that would enable them to become self employed if offered training, short term financing and professional follow up assistance. Many of these talented and skilled individuals are unemployed or they are employed in low wage seasonal occupations. However, with sufficient opportunity, they can start a small business that will provide them with an improved standard of living. The majority of such individuals have little or no savings, a nonexistent credit history, and no access to capital or credit. Women, minorities and low to moderate income individuals have added difficulty obtaining credit.

The RLF will provide gap financing, up to 50%, not to exceed \$25,000 to leverage traditional financing. The key to success for this project lies within an innovative screening process. Only those individuals who agree to attend training sessions and develop an approved business plan or individuals that are successfully operating a small business will qualify for loan funds.

Our decision to develop this project has been promoted by the long term depressed economy in our project area, a recent capital market analysis and the success of similar projects areas of the state.

De-Go-La is initially funded for \$100,000 to begin this project.

I'm really excited about the opportunities that are developing in the De-Go-La area. The fact that the council will soon be able to stimulate small business development through a revolving loan program demonstrates the commitment that the board of directors and our many partners have to make rural communities better places to live. We have just completed a contract with the Coastal Bend Bays and Estuaries Program to restore important Riparian Habitats in Aransas, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties. In reviewing the sites, I became very aware of the many benefits and sometimes drastic changes for the better that can come about through changes in management of these areas alone. Bare eroding areas are now vegetated and overall water quality and wildlife habitat are improved. As we continue to pursue this program in Victoria, Calhoun and Jackson Counties, I hope that we will be able to form even stronger partnerships with agencies that may be able to provide additional funding for these benefits.
